



How can we work together to reduce wildlife/vehicle collisions on Highway 75?

- **DRIVE CAREFULLY** — Be aware of wildlife “hot spots” and slow down, especially at night when visibility is poor.
- **OBEY SPEED LIMITS** — Slow down for speed limit reduction along the highway. Speed limits are there for your safety and to preserve wildlife.
- **BE ALERT** — Be alert for animals and ask your passengers to do the same. Slow down when you see them as they can run onto the road without warning.

Day/Night Speed Limit North Of Hailey

Highway 75 north of Hailey from McKercher Boulevard to Zinc Spur is the first area in the Wood River Valley with a new day/night speed limit intended to decrease the number of collisions with wildlife.

The reduced speed limit is intended to allow drivers additional time to identify wildlife on or near the roadway and reduce reaction time and stopping distances.
