


Mid-Valley Subarea	
<b>Cities or Towns</b>	Triumph, an unincorporated, historic mining town; three canyons with rural residential development
<b>Public Lands</b>	70% managed by the USFS, 12% BLM, and 2% State owned. 16% private land.
<b>Geography</b>	Greenhorn, Deer Creek and East Fork canyons lead from the Big Wood River valley out to public lands and remote mountainous areas. Surrounded by Smoky and Pioneer Mountains and their foothills.

Recreation	
<b>Activities Overview</b>	Hiking/biking/horseback riding in Greenhorn Gulch, Deer Creek and East Fork canyons, all with extensive recreational use. Numerous fishing access points along the Big Wood River and Deer Creek and East Fork tributaries. Limited remote camping out Deer Creek and East Fork.
<b>Primary Recreation Sites &amp; Facilities</b>	Wood River Trail. Trailhead access at Greenhorn Gulch, Deer Creek and East Fork Canyon. Valley Club golf and tennis facilities. Shooting center and motorbike park in Ohio Gulch. Equestrian facilities.
<b>Rivers and Streams</b>	Big Wood River, Deer Creek and East Fork tributaries.

County Services Related to Recreation	
<b>Road &amp; Bridge</b>	Greenhorn, East Fork and Deer Creek Roads used regularly for road cycling, with limited shoulder development.
<b>Leased Land</b>	Motorbike track/park on County owned land at Ohio Gulch Transfer Station.
<b>Snowmobile</b>	Groomed trails at Cove Creek (connecting with Quigley Creek).
